

Few of the large show kites made it into the air, instead lolling on the sand beach. The aerobatic kite shows went on, but only the ultra-lites were able to harness the weak breeze. One performance team made three attempts to perform before getting moderate success, and that team has been together for 34 years.

After a few hours taking in all that was there, we boarded the shuttle bus to return to our vehicles. I had declared I did not want to travel on the "super-slab" on the way home, so we ad-libbed. Not being totally familiar with this area, I took a sideways glance at the map and off we drove. As you would expect, turns were missed – and that is how we ended up at the Duck Creek Winery. The wine sampling went well, and resulted in the purchase of several bottles of excellent, fruity wines.

We crossed the Fox River at DePere and followed secondary roads through Ashwaubenon and Green Bay. We drove Hwy 29/32 out of Green Bay. Toni and Jim stayed on Hwy 32 to take them back to Antigo, while we remained on Hwy 29 back to Shawano. Alas, we did not make an ice cream stop, so this cannot qualify as a complete ride. It was an enjoyable day for being with Miata friends.







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Viking River Cruise





On July 7, eight members of the Badgerland Miata Club (two were given honorary member status even though they are T-Bird Enthusiasts) took off to explore three rivers of Europe. Ginger and Brian Carney, Toni and Jim Thomas, Ron and Cheri Staub, and Randy and Laura Staub joined with members of the Utah Miata Club and several other groups for the Grand European Tour. We explored Amsterdam for two days seeing sites like the Anne Frank House, the Handbag Museum, the Van Gogh Museum, Amsterdam's Red Light District and the famous canals. We also learned to watch out for bicyclists; this may be the only city that seems to have more bikes than cars. All streets include bike and pedestrian lanes, and they are well used. We embarked the Viking Skirnir Monday morning, explored our homes for the next 15 days, and still had time to wander around Amsterdam one last time.

We sailed Monday night on the Rhine River stopping at Kinderdijk (Netherlands), Cologne, Koblenz and Miltenberg. We took walking tours at every stop and then had some free time to explore on our own. Most of the sites we visited are UNESCO World Heritage Sites. Kinderdijk featured the famous Dutch Windmills, Cologne the largest Gothic Cathedral in Northern Europe, Koblenz the Marksburg Castle and in Miltenberg we saw the charming medieval town including Miltenberg Castle. Oh, and a wonderful small candy shop that features excellent black licorice. One of the highlights was viewing castles on hilltops and vineyards along the Rhine River as we cruised on a beautiful, sunny afternoon. Some of the castles were in ruins, but most had been updated to be hotels, hostels, schools or even private residences. This area has many vineyards and wineries but also breweries. Brian and Jim sampled many of these after their walking tours.

After Miltenberg we left the Rhine River and entered the Main River (pronounced "mine"), stopping at Wurzburg and Bamberg. We did walking tours of both cities with the highlights being Bishop's Palace in Wurzburg and the 11th century cathedral in Bamberg. There was an arts festival in Bamberg with many street performers and musicians. Very fun but very crowded. Bamberg is also famous for its smoked flavored beer. Unique and only made in this area. Rumor has it that it was started by accident when the brew master burned the hops and was too cheap to discard them.

After Bamberg we entered the canal that connects the Main and Danube Rivers, stopping at Nuremburg, Regensburg and Passau. Again we took walking tours of all three cities. Nuremburg was mostly destroyed in the war and has been completely rebuilt. The old town is surrounded by a fort which was never captured until World War II. Regensburg was mostly spared during the war because there was little industry and many of the building were from the 13th and 14th centuries. We sampled the beer and sausage at the oldest sausage house in Germany, too. It was a treat after a long visit on a hot day. Passau is the home of 17th century St. Stephen's Cathedral where we marveled at the organ concert music from its 17,000 pipes. We also discovered a wonderful little stationary shop owned by an older woman and her family, who designed many of the papers.

After entering the Danube we stopped at Melk, Vienna and Budapest. In Melk we toured the city, and then the Melk Abbey which is still in use today as an abbey and local school. Some of us visited a winery in the Wachau Valley that afternoon. It was very entertaining to hear the banter back and forth as the Austrian vintner explained in German and the guide then translated for us! The vintner was a very generous pourer and proud of his award winning wines. We spent two days in Vienna visiting the city and the palaces. Some of us took Vienneses Waltz lessons (ask Toni and Ginger about their dance partners) and some of us attended an evening Mozart and Strauss Concert. The final city was Budapest, and this may have been the most beautiful city of all. We undocked the boat the last night of our cruise and motored between Buda and Pest to view in awe the lit up Chain Bridge and Parliament.



Beside the tours there was also entertainment on the boat. We had lectures on the various areas through which we cruised, a German language mini-lesson, glass blowing and cooking demonstrations. and medieval costumed opera singers. We also had two trivia contests. The Badgerland Miata Club won the music trivia contest (like we needed three more bottles of wine). The food was good and there was plenty of it. Many dishes were local but standard cuisine was always available as well.





Most of the group headed home on July 24, but Cheri and I planned to visit Dubrovnik in Croatia. In case you don't know, this is a walled city built in the 14th century and it is the site used for filming Kings Landing in the HBO series *Game of Thrones*. So we took a *Game of Thrones Tour* to find where the scenes were shot. We also found out parts of *Star Wars 8* were shot in Dubrovnik (that explained why all the stores were selling Star Wars merchandise). We were told they filmed for a month and it will probably be about three minutes in the film. It will be the gambling planet if you see the film. They also filmed a new Robin Hood film in Dubrovnik which will be out in March or April.
